Course Description

In this course, students learn personal and interpersonal skills transferable to adventure programs and trips. Students examine leadership theory, acquire group management and decision making skills and apply this knowledge to the area of adventure leadership. Self-awareness and developing sound leadership judgement will be emphasized. Outdoor skill teaching and group facilitation are other key skills developed through experiential applications in class and outdoors.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognise their personal leadership style and group role preferences.
- 2. Understand the role of facilitation in the experiential learning cycle
- 3. Identify the stages of group development and how to best respond to them.
- 4. Understand the leadership styles and techniques appropriate to a variety of group situations.
- 5. Value differences in group roles and leadership styles.
- 6. Develop instructional skills.
- 7. Recognise the importance of key concepts such as; communication, trust development, problem solving in understanding groups within an outdoor adventure setting.

Assignments:

All assignments are due on the due date stated in the Assessment Plan.
